





Padma Lakshmi has always had a thing for New York's skyline. Now, with new additions like Le Bain at The Standard, Plunge Rooftop Bar + Lounge at Gansevoort Park Avenue NYC and The Surrey hotel's Private Roof Garden, she explains why Manhattan's rooftops are the hottest place to party. # PLUNGE ROOFTOP BAR + LOUNGE

### AT GANSEVOORT PARK AVENUE NYC

The rooftop bar at the first Hotel Gansevoort turned the Meatpacking District from a nighttime no-go area to a shopping mall of revelry, where new bars, lounges and restaurants were springing up almost weekly amidst downtown staples like Pastis, Spice Market and Soho House. But if you think you've been there and done that, you might be surprised by the newest Gansevoort addition: Gansevoort Park Avenue NYC.

The Plunge Rooftop Bar + Lounge is Gansevoort Park Avenue NYC's homage to the steel and structure of New York City architecture. The centrepiece here is a 40ft, glass-enclosed indoor and outdoor plunge pool. Only available to hotel guests during the day, the pool opens up to the public in the evenings. A dip on a moonlit night with the Empire State Building peering down on you will render the cocktails unnecessary... almost. Their Mango-Lime Rickeys and Grapefruit Cosmos are to thirst for.

The bar serves finger-sized bites—the mini-burgers with cheese and truffle oil are a hit—and at night the music beats eclectic, from Brazilian to New Age to pop. No wonder Justin Timberlake celebrated here after the Cinema Society preview of *The Social Network* by chilling at the pool with buddies Lance Bass and Timbaland.

On her bar-hopping tour with Condé Nast Traveller, Padma stands, surveying the scene beneath her. The sun glows pink, catching the shoulders of her jacket and the roof of a striking building none of us had noticed before. Padma remarks, "I love finding beauty in the nontraditional. I like to look down at my feet and see below them. I love seeing the rooftops of these buildings stretch endlessly. It's inspiring." Now, standing beneath a setting sun, we toast the city and the night as they stretch out before us.

### **LE BAIN** AT THE STANDARD, NEW YORK

The iconic Top of the Standard bar put the boom boom back in New York City nightlife when it opened in late 2009, and enjoyed an uncontested reign over velvet ropes around town... until now.

Welcome to Le Bain, the newest and most fabulous nightspot in the Meatpacking District's The Standard, New York hotel. The name is an irreverent French kiss to the golden splendour of its 18th floor neighbour, the Boom Boom Room. But Le Bain itself is modern: black walls and black furniture surround a 'pool' (an oversized hot-tub beneath a glittering disco ball) while a vending machine dispenses bathing suits, in case you're not up for going au naturel. Upstairs on the roof, synthetic grass and white wicker furniture offer a cheeky, kitsch contrast to the spectacular Manhattan views.

Today, the outlook is made yet more breathtaking by Padma Lakshmi, who approaches with a languid grace and a sweep of jet-black hair. "I love it up here," she says. "But not just because it's traditionally beautiful. The Boom Boom Room is where I meet friends if I want an elegant setting to sip some champagne and sit by the fire. Le Bain is edgier. The black walls and glass windows reveal the skeleton of the building. I've always had a proclivity for the industrial. I find it beautiful." Padma is not alone—other fans of this watering hole include James Franco, Susan Sarandon, Chloë Sevigny and Waris Ahluwalia. Le Bain also caters to a refreshing mix of downtown hipsters and post-midnight revellers, drawn to the way Le Bain strips away pretension (you can order chips with your beer, or a Raspberry Collins with a few slices of fresh watermelon to beat the heat).

As we peer down at the toy-town pedestrians on the pavement below, Padma laughingly exclaims, "This place is so deliciously *Mad Men* meets *The Jetsons*!" All we see is the siren, the skyscrapers, and the endless city sky.
